From the Principal

The Pillars Underpinning Progress

SCOTS PGC College continues to be a dynamic and vibrant community. We are presently experiencing a renewed energy around the College with growing enrolments from both day and boarding students, an expanding and deep Co-Curricular program, excellent Teaching and Learning programs being led by great staff and an evolving Pastoral Care program to enhance our students' well-being and development.

When thinking of our school, we often see and process what our students are doing and achieving, but we sometimes skip over or miss the work underpinning these things. Whilst teaching and learning from a pastoral, academic and co-curricular perspective will always remain our core business, there are several important pillars in our structure that allow us to support our students and the operations of our College as a whole. These important pillars at SCOTS PGC are our Foundation, our Council, our Past Students Association, and our Parents and Friends Association. All of whom are intertwined, yet separate in the ways in which they support our school.

Our College Council, led by Mr Martin Webb, provides strategic direction and corporate governance, ensuring our operations are compliant both financially and in terms of risk management and delegation. The members, whose names, backgrounds and experience can be found on our website, have expertise in town planning, marketing, business operations and education. They provide the oversight of how we operate from a strategic altitude. They support, challenge, question, endorse what management at the College is doing. They operate with a 'noses in, fingers out' philosophy in terms of all College operations.

The Foundation pillar operates as a separate entity, charged with raising and administering funds to support a variety of areas within the College. They receive and administer funding to support bursaries and scholarship programs, the compliment, to building and maintenance matters so that the school is able to ensure fit for purpose resources of a physical nature. In an independent school context, a school's Foundation is essential in ensuring we are able to provide an excellent environment for current and future generations of SCOTS PGC students. Recently the College, with the support of the Foundation, appointed Sarah Henry to the position of Foundation Manager, with a view of focussing Foundation activities on future initiatives that the College will need to develop. Alongside Tracy Dobie, the newly elected Chair of Foundation, and other new members, the Foundation will work collaboratively with the College to bring initiatives identified in the College's strategic plan to life.



The Foundation often works collaboratively with our Past Students Association in not only fundraising but providing a network for past and current students for mutual benefit. This pillar is important in keeping past students of SCOTS, PGC and SCOTS PGC connected to each other and the College, providing social and networking opportunities and connecting with current students and sharing what it means to be from SCOTS PGC. With the election of Carly Goddard to President of this group, this pillar is looking to reinvigorate engagement from past students with each other and the school. Importantly, they are also looking at setting up a mentoring program, connecting past students with current ones, especially in terms of study and employment pathways. This is an exciting step forward for our past students and the College!

The fourth important pillar is our Parents and Friends Association. This group, with newly elected President Lindsay Burgess, has provided support in the purchase of many resources over the last few years. They have been integral in working with the Student Council to fund and develop plans for a shade structure to be placed over the dining hall entry, a new lathe for the Tech shed, a sound system for our bands and drones for our STEM activity, just to name a few. Very significantly, the Parents and Friends Association has recently committed to a significant amount of funds that will allow the College to build a new Junior School playground in the Christmas holiday period in recognition of our recent centenary celebrations. In conjunction, this pillar provides opportunities for parents to mix socially and share experiences as well as providing an avenue for the school's management to report school matters at their monthly meeting.

As you can see, there is a variety of important groups underpinning all we do at SCOTS PGC. For our school and our community to be achieving excellence and ensuring a strong future, these groups need to be proactive, supportive and engaged with each other and the College as a whole. It is pleasing and refreshing to work in a school with energy across all of these important pillars and I thank all those involved for their selfless generosity and for what they bring to the tapestry of our school, now and into the future.

HONOURING WARRANT OFFICER WILLIAM **EMERSON GILMORE RAAF**

The College held its annual ANZAC Day Dawn Service on Friday 23 April 2021 with large crowds of students, parents, staff and special guests travelling near and far to honour our Magnificent 42 Past Students who paid the ultimate price for our freedom.

This years' service commemorated the life of Warrant Officer William Emerson Gilmore R.A.A.F. Current College Captain and direct descendant, William Gilmore read an excerpt from Profiles of Courage (written by John Telfer in 2007) to give the audience a brief history of William's life.

8685 WARRANT OFFICER WILLIAM EMERSON GILMORE, RAAF

William Emerson Gilmore was born in Allora, Queensland delivered. However, on 10 October 1917. He was the son of William and Alice Gilmore and lived on a farm called "Temuka" situated a short distance from the town.

William attended Allora State School for his early education before enrolling at Scots College after he had passed the State Scholarship examination in 1931. Arriving at Scots in 1932, William did not stand out much in the sport offered at the College but proved to be an intelligent and industrious student who, in 1933, gained his Junior Certificate with one A. four Bs. and one C.

On leaving school, William worked on the family farm until he enlisted into the RAAF at Laverton, Victoria, on the 5 February 1940. At first William worked in ground crew for over twelve months before he decided to use his solid academic background, by remustering to aircrew on 21 June 1941, to undertake a flying course. After successfully gaining a position on an aircrew course, he was posted to No 2 Service Flying Training School at Wagga, N.S.W.

While in training, William experienced the dangers of flying when he was involved in a plane crash. Flying a Wirraway aircraft in a night exercise, William received serious injuries from his lucky escape, and this kept him away from flying for some time. However, not to be deterred, William was now completely "hooked" on flying and kept badgering his Commanding Officer to be allowed back into the cockpit. His persistence paid off and after a complete recovery from his injuries, William was posted to No 5 Service Flying Training School to complete his course and attain his "Wings". After completing his training in Wireless and Air Gunnery, William was promoted to Sergeant Pilot and awaited an operational posting.

William received his wish when he was posted to No 78 Squadron which was now equipped with American P-40 Kittyhawks. This aircraft had now replaced the rather cumbersome and inadequate Wirraway, which was no match for the Japanese Zero fighter. Even the Kittyhawk required a good deal of skill to master, as in the first two weeks of delivery to Australia and her ally, America, they lost 30 with 49 Pursuit Group USAAF losing 140 Of 330

despite this record, became our front and William, now promoted to Warrant

Officer, took part in attacking Japanese ground forces and installations. He was also flying escort duty for Bombers in their missions over the New Guinea area. In June 1944, Warrant Officer Gilmore was a member of an attack force of sixteen Kittyhawks which dived on a formation of twelve Japanese Zeros and three Dive bombers. They destroyed and downed nine enemy aircraft and damaged another six with minimal loss to the squadron.

On October 14 1944, Warrant Officer William Gilmore, now based with 78 Squadron at Noemfoor in Hollandia, was to fly his final mission. Flying at No.4 in formation, William aircraft which was searching for a missing pilot from 80 Squadron, over the area of the Kai Islands. After the group made contact with the Catalina, William's Kittyhawk did not appear with the rest of the formation. Some garbled radio contact was made with William, but then his aircraft was never heard or seen again.

formation until their low fuel tanks made them abandon the search. As the Kittyhawks had experienced some ground fire while over the Kai Islands, it was assumed that William's aircraft had received some damage. In trying to radio the group leader, there was a possibility that he crashed into the sea and was now presumed dead. Next day, the search continued using Catalina aircraft but no trace was ever found.

William Gilmore was 27 years old and his name is now commemorated on the Ambon Memorial to the Missing,

Education is a facilitator for success, it opens doors and creates opportunities. Excellent education is not necessarily just excellent academics. It should empower the students to achieve their educational goals, both inside and outside the classroom. The vast co-curricular offerings are also vitally important as they allow students to develop different skills and attributes, as is service to the community.

Our academic results last year were outstanding, with 33% students achieving an ATAR of above 90 and 98% of students passing their general subjects, with our Dux, Andrew Wu, achieving an amazing 99.25. This, coupled with over 50% of the 2020 cohort completing certificates, has meant another excellent year. This puts SCOTS PGC College amongst the top achieving schools in Queensland. But this is not the only way to measure success, as 85% of students who applied for University were offered their first or second choice and there were many who successfully achieved Vocational Education qualifications, completed apprenticeships, and obtained employment as a direct result.

We are all unique. At SCOTS PGC we aim to celebrate that and to nurture every individual to be the best that they can be.



-Gift to Zambia

Several years ago our Uniform Shop Convenor Deb Perry was contacted by Jim McNamara. Jim is involved in an organisation called 'To the Nations Zambia' that helps to provide necessary materials and equipment to countries in need. Chris Shadbolt is the gentleman who facilitates the shipments and in recent years, has sent containers to Zambia, Malawi, South Sedan, Swaziland, Kenya and Nigeria. Deb answered the call and packed boxes full of preloved College uniforms to be sent across.


Jim says 'We fill 40 ft containers with medical equipment, hospital beds x-ray units, wheelchairs, crutches and supplies to be sent to hospitals and clinics out in the bush. We also send school supplies, books, desks and chairs, stationery etc. Shipping costs are around \$300 per cubic metre, so we have strict conditions to ensure that only quality goods are sent. When goods are distributed from the containers, there is great excitement and appreciation that someone they do not know from the other side of the world has helped to fulfil their needs. The hunger shown by these children to learn and achieve so they can get good professional jobs later on is inspiring.'

Late last year, Jim dropped into the College again and brought photos of some Zambian school students in our College jerseys which they used as rugby team kit. Their coaches looked the part as well in the College's maroon jersey. Jim said for most of these students it was the first piece of uniform they had ever worn and they cherished the items. Even though he has visited the country on many occasions, Jim said it still brings him much joy and added, 'Your generosity has made a huge difference to these communities. So on behalf of the Zambians who received uniforms from you, we say thankyou.'

Rejuvenating our Riverbank Ecosystems

Our Year 7 students are excited to be involved in an authentic project that will leave a positive legacy for the College community. Students have been involved in assessing the biodiversity (range of living things) in the Condamine Riverbank ecosystem and then implementing their own plans to improve it.

Funding for this project has been made available through Earthwatch Australia, a Government funded organisation that seeks to improve students' understanding of the interconnectedness of living things on Earth.

Students have so far identified a range of native and introduced plant species, with the assistance of local Landcare Co-ordinator Tanya Jobling, and made plans about how to restore native vegetation to the banks of the river, with the expert assistance of native plant enthusiast Susan Savage.

Boys and girls used mathematical skills to mark out the area and design a planting scheme, before using their muscles to dig holes, plant and water. Unfortunately, the planting site went underwater in the recent flooding of Condamine River, but all hope is not lost, the students are still excited to see what other positive changes they can make to the area going forward.

scholarships & bursaries

Scholarship of General Excellence

Open to new and current students entering Years 6-12. Students must demonstrate their excellence in a particular field and also sit an external EDUTEST examination.

Applications are open all year round.

Rural Boarding Scholarship

Open to new students (not currently enrolled) who wish to enter Years 5-12 as a full-time boarding student. Students must be from a rural background and satisfy key eligibility criteria.

Applications are open all year round.

Foundation Scholarship Fund

Open to students who are able to demonstrate that their financial circumstances would otherwise preclude them from attending the College.

Applications close 30 June 2021

ACER Academic Scholarships

Open to new and current students entering Years 7 to 11 in the year following the ACER Scholarship Test. Applications for entry in 2022 have closed. Applications for entry in 2023 will close in early February 2022. Please check our website for details. Scholarships are available to Australian citizens only.


At the beginning of this year, a number of very committed and long serving committee members stepped down so we now

her sister Suzanne Kienzle (Class of 2002), walked the Kokoda Trail.





Pyke (1965 – 70) (L/M), Sandy Goodwin (1967 – 71) and Ian Goulter (1967 – 72).


